## Legal Reality Check

Are you trekking in a restricted or protected area?

*Examples: Certain regions of Sikkim, Ladakh, Uttarakhand, or Inner Line Permit zones*

**GUIDE MANDATORY**

Local regulations legally require an authorized guide. No safe or legal alternative exists.

**NO**

**Proceed to Step 2**

Continue to the next filter to assess altitude risks.

Will you sleep above 4,500 meters at any point?

### ALTITUDE REFERENCE SCALE

● 3,500m — AMS risk begins    ● 4,500m — Decision threshold    ● 5,000m+ — Severe risk zone

#### YES

#### GUIDE STRONGLY RECOMMENDED

Monitoring acclimatization, illness symptoms, and descent decisions becomes critical.

#### NO

#### Proceed to Step 3

Continue to assess terrain and objective hazards.

### Does your route involve any of the following?

- Glaciers or permanent snowfields
- High mountain passes
- Unbridged river crossings
- Landslide-prone terrain
- Route-finding off marked trails

#### YES

#### **GUIDE STRONGLY RECOMMENDED**

Technical judgment and real-time terrain assessment are required.

#### NO

#### **Proceed to Step 4**

Continue to assess seasonal conditions.

Are you trekking outside the autumn window (late September–November)?

### SEASONAL NOTES

#### Spring

Snow & meltwater

#### Monsoon

Landslides & navigation

#### Winter

Extreme cold & snow

### YES

#### **GUIDE STRONGLY RECOMMENDED**

Seasonal conditions significantly increase risk and skill requirements.

### NO

#### **Proceed to Step 5**

Continue to assess isolation and logistics.

### Does your trek involve any of the following?

- More than 7–10 days
- Few or no villages
- No daily access to food or shelter

#### YES

#### **GUIDE STRONGLY RECOMMENDED**

Self-rescue options are limited and consequences escalate quickly.

#### NO

#### **Proceed to Final Assessment**

# Your Result

## Independent Trekking Is Usually Reasonable

Conditions typically include:

- Lower altitude
- Established trails
- Village or teahouse support
- Stable autumn season

*Preparation and judgment remain essential.*

## Guide Strongly Recommended

Risk factors are present that require advanced judgment. Proceed independently only if your skills fully match the terrain and conditions.

## Guide Mandatory

Legal, seasonal, or technical factors make independent trekking unsafe or unlawful.

This decision tree does not replace thinking — it disciplines it. The safest trek is not the boldest plan, but the one that aligns your skills, season, and terrain with the mountain's reality.
